- <u>Learning (Not) to talk About Race: When Older Children Underperform in Social Categorization</u> Older children (10-11 years) underperform relative to younger children (8-9 years) in a "Guess Who?" type game because older children have learned to avoid talking about race.
- Exploring How Conversations about Race Influence Children's Implicit Biases
 - White children (8-12 years old) showed less implicit bias against Black people after semi-structured discussions about racism with a parent, even when their parent showed behavioral signs of nervousness.
- The Development of Implicit Attitudes: Evidence of Race Evaluations From Ages 6
 and 10 and Adulthood A comparison of White American's attitudes towards Blacks
 among 6 year olds, 10 year olds, and adults found that White Americans' self-reported
 attitudes become more egalitarian as they age. However, their implicit attitudes show
 similar levels of pro-White bias regardless of age.
- <u>Racial/Ethnic Socialization for White Youth: What We Know and Future Directions</u> A summary of empirical research on teaching and talking about race with children and adults, broken down into categories: early childhood (age 3-8), middle childhood (age 9-11), adolescence (12-18), and young adulthood (18-25).
- Interracial Roommate Relationships: An Experimental Field Test of the Contact
 Hypothesis White college freshmen were randomly assigned to live with a White or
 Black dorm roommate. At the end of the quarter, although White students reported
 feeling more satisfied if they had a same-race roommate, those in an interracial
 roommate relationship saw a reduction in their implicit racial biases.
- Two Strikes: Race and the Disciplining of Young Students K-12 teachers reported a
 repeated offense as being more severe if the offender was a Black student instead of
 a White student. In addition, they were more likely to label the Black student as a
 troublemaker and see the behavior as indicative of an ongoing pattern, which in turn
 led to harsher disciplinary actions against Black students.
- Do Differences Make a Difference? The Effects of Diversity on Learning, Intergroup
 Outcomes, and Civic Engagement Although interactions with diverse others initially
 tend to feel more effortful than interactions with similar others, increased exposure to
 dissimilar others (e.g., race, socioeconomic background) are associated with
 beneficial outcomes in terms of learning, attitudes/stereotypes, and civic engagement.
