





Ten Ways Educators Can Resist Transgender Erasure
Continue teaching an LGBTQ-inclusive curriculum.
2 As an ally, learn and adopt transgender policies that are in place.
Learn and use an individual's preferred pronoun and name.
Foster an inclusive classroom and refrain from using gender indicators for creating groups or teams.
5 Recognize the intersection of transgender identity and other identities.
Introduce the contributions of LGBTQ people into your classroom and provide books and stories to reflect diversity.
Learn and incorporate transgender and Two-Spirit history.
8 Teach and use appropriate terminology (e.g., Two-Spirit, transgender, cisgender, etc.)
Pach the difference between gender identity and gender expression.
10 Start or encourage participation in Gay Straight Alliances (GSAs).

Ten Ways to Support Trans Students and Educators

- 1. Provide a safe, inclusive and trans positive space.
- 2. Speak out about transphobic and homophobic language in your school.
- 3. Challenge transphobic jokes and derogatory comments.
- 4. Use an individual's preferred pronouns and names.
- 5. Introduce the contributions of LGBTQ people into your program.
- 6. Ask students to line up using gender-neutral language (e.g., age, birthday, color of clothing, etc.).
- 7. Provide awareness and education.
- 8. Be a role model of acceptance.
- 9. Provide picture books and resources in your program that reflect the wide array of LGBTQ people.
- 10. Be a trans ally.
