## Welcome Back!

- Get to know your students. Build community by learning about them. <u>Learn your students' pronouns</u>.
- Learn how to say your students' names. <u>Pronounce</u> <u>them correctly</u>. Only use a nickname if the student shares that preferred name with you.
- Begin with reflection. We do not have to return to <u>"school as usual."</u> Consider what went well last year, and what you might want to do differently.
- <u>Take the time to care for yourself.</u> These times are incredibly stressful. Please do what you have to do to take care of yourself. Counseling for staff, PD opportunities, and resources are available.

#### Latinx Heritage Month

From 9/15 - 10/15, we observe Latinx Heritage Month as a way to honor and celebrate the diversity, cultures, histories, and contributions of the Latinx community.

Please see this additional description written by Jill Ceballos, Equity Specialist from East Somerville Community School:

#### <u>Latinx vs. Hispanic</u>

Sometimes these terms are used interchangeably. However, Hispanic refers to any Spanish-speaking culture, so it includes Spain along with Spanish-speaking Latin American countries. Latinx (or Latine/a/o) refers to Latin American countries, including both Spanish and non-Spanish speaking nations in the Caribbean, Central America, South America, and North America. This means our Haitian and Brazilian students are Latinx!

It is important to distinguish between these two terms because their histories are very different. Latin American countries have Indigenous roots and were colonized, while Spain (a Hispanic country) colonized them.

#### **Diversity Within the Latinx Community**

It is important to remember that the Latinx community is incredibly diverse in race, gender identities, language, and religion. I encourage you to be thoughtful about this as you choose books and activities to share with students, since there is not "one way" to be Latinx. Also, it is essential to amplify Black Latinx, Asian Latinx, and Indigenous experiences, as they are often not as represented in our celebration of Latinx Heritage month, but are still very much Latinx.

This is a great reminder that race, ethnicity, and identity often intersect for many people, so while these months are a great opportunity to celebrate different cultures, it is crucial that representation for all identities is considered all year long!

#### Indigenous Peoples' Day

Hispanic/Latinx Heritage month transitions into Indigenous Peoples' Day. Consider setting the foundation now and work with students on recognizing the Indigenous roots of Latin America. Highlight the work Indigenous people have done and continue to do to fight for their language and culture against colonization. There is also a growing movement of Latinx who are working to reclaim their Indigenous roots.






