

6. Are you satisfied or dissatisfied with your child's education at their current school?



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



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


Student Data and Privacy





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



21. Do you think social media has a positive or negative impact on your child?





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


Big Tech Influence



25. Do you support or oppose Congress passing a law requiring Big Tech companies to report how their business practices can negatively impact children?



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


Other Concerns



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Research Design

Research Design



WPA Intelligence conducted a study of parents nationwide.

WPAi selected a random sample of registered voters from the national voter file using Registration Based sampling (RBS) who were then screened down to parents. The sample for this survey was stratified based on geography, age, gender, partisanship, and ethnicity. This methodology allows us to avoid post-survey "weighting" which can reduce the reliability of survey results.

Respondents were contacted by phone via a live telephone operator to landlines (n=153) and cell phones (n=218), as well as by SMS (n=451) linking to an online survey, August 23-29, 2022. The study has a sample size of n=822 parents and a MoE= +/-3.4% in 95 out of 100 cases.





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
