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

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We're back!

Make your way to Atlantic City for the 2022 NJEA Convention



Welcome back to the largest educational gathering of its kind in the world! The NJEA Convention provides first-class professional experiences for educators of every job description, whether your work finds you in the classroom, the main office, the school bus, the cafeteria, the front door, the hallways and grounds, or anywhere else where NJEA members serve New Jersey's 1.4 million students.

There are two ways to attend the convention: in person at the Atlantic City Convention Center or virtually from home. As you peruse this program you'll notice nearly 150 workshops that are designed for in-person attendees and nearly 70 additional workshops are designed for virtual attendance.

The theme for the NJEA Convention is

"Learning. Equity. Justice." The theme reflects our role in the ongoing work of preparing our nation's children, adolescents and young adults for a future we can only imagine and in the generational work of building a just and equitable society.

You'll see the theme reflected in the workshops, especially those gathered under the heading "Inclusive School Culture." And you'll find it in the lineup of keynote speakers: LeVar Burton, Nyle DiMarco, Nikole Hannah-Jones and David Hogg. You'll also see the convention theme reflected in some new features this year. In the NJEA Consortium, found in the Exhibit Hall, members will explore and express their intersectional identities while developing their expertise in teaching true and accurate history. And a series of workshops will be

delivered in Spanish to serve the needs of our members whose first language is Spanish.

Many old favorites will return to Atlantic City, such as Digital Boulevard, Main Street NJEA, the vendors in the Exhibit Hall, and the Celebration of Excellence. The celebration will introduce the 2022-23 New Jersey State Teacher of the Year, recognize the 2022 Educational Support Professional of the Year, confer the Awards for Excellence on graduates of New Jersey public schools who excel in their fields of endeavor, and announce grant recipients through the NJEA Frederick L. Hipp Foundation for Excellence in Education.

The convention also gives you the opportunity to speak truth to power. Acting Commissioner of Education Angelica Allen-McMillan and the State Board of Education have a direct impact on the work you do every day in your schools. On Friday, Nov. 11 they will hold a session in Hall A where you can ask them your questions and share your perspective.

We are looking forward to seeing as many members as possible, as safely as possible. Guided by the standards of the New Jersey Department of Health and the CDC, the NJEA Convention Committee has worked closely with NJEA staff and with staff at the Atlantic City Convention Center to ensure a healthier and safer convention for everyone who attends. Should changes in pandemic conditions or public health guidance necessitate any changes to the planned program, we will communicate that to members as quickly as possible.

We look forward to seeing you, in person or virtually, on Nov. 10 and 11.

FAQs

Your FAQs about the NJEA Convention answered

In-person admission, registration & workshops

How do I register for the in-person convention?

Registering in advance for the NJEA Convention will speed your entry. To register, go to *njea.org/njeaconventionsessions*. You will need:

- An email address.
- Your NJEA personal identification number (PIN). You'll find your PIN on your membership card. Your PIN has six characters in a two letter-two number-two letter combination.

After you register, you will receive a follow-up email with additional information. Note that in-person registrants may also attend virtual sessions. However, you will need your own device— it is recommended that you use a desktop or laptop computer, not a tablet or phone, to attend your virtual workshops.

Where do I pick up my badge for the in-person convention?

Go to the second floor of the convention center. Each morning, the first 700 members to pick up their badge will receive a \$10 lunch voucher that may only be redeemed in the convention center—the limit is one voucher per member until the limit is reached, and the voucher is distributed only when you first receive your badge.

If I didn't register in advance, can I still come?

Yes. Be sure to bring your membership card with you. Again, registering in advance is recommended to save time upon arrival at the convention center.

I did not receive my membership card. How do I gain admission?

There will be a location available at registration for members to verify their membership. Bring photo identification.

You can also access an image of your membership card on your phone. Visit njea.org. After you log in, tap "Menu," then tap "My NJEA." (To log in, use your PIN or the email address you have registered with NJEA as your PIN. Your password is the last four digits of your Social Security number unless you've changed your password.)

Do I need to register for in-person workshops?

There is no preregistration to enroll for in-person workshops. Arrive at your preferred workshop as early as possible to ensure your seat. You may wish to select a second-choice workshop if the room for your first choice reaches capacity before your arrival.

Virtual workshops

How do I register for virtual workshops?

Preregistration is required to enroll in virtual workshops and to access the keynote livestreams. The workshops listed on pages 21 to 24 will be presented in a virtual format. Three of the four keynote speakers, LeVar Burton, Nyle DiMarco and David Hogg, will be livestreamed for members not attending in person. To register you'll need an email address and your PIN as listed on your NJEA membership card. If you do not have your NJEA membership card, see the question above, "I did not receive my membership card. How do I gain admission?" which explains how you can find your card on the NJEA website.

After you register, you will receive a follow-up email to enroll in the workshops you select. It is recommended that you use a desktop or laptop computer, not a tablet or phone, to attend your virtual workshops.

Proof of attendance: in person and virtual

How will I get my certificate of attendance?

In-person attendees will receive a certificate of attendance when they receive their convention badge at the Atlantic City Convention Center. Virtual attendees must log in to the NJEA Convention on Nov. 10 or Nov. 11. At the end of first day on which you log in, a certificate of attendance will be emailed to you.

How do I get a record of the sessions I've attended?

Professional development certificates will be issued electronically after the end of each session. Be sure to have your badge scanned when you enter a session on the third or fourth floors or in Digital Boulevard session. You will receive an email with a link to your certificates after each session ends.

What if my district requires me to be at my school on NJEA Convention days rather than at the convention?

New Jersey law provides certain school employees the opportunity to be absent from school without loss of salary or time for the purpose of attending the convention. N.J. Statute 18A:31-2 states, "Whenever any full-time teaching staff member or any secretary or office clerk applies to the board of education for permission to attend the Annual Convention of the New Jersey Education Association, such permission shall be granted for not more than two days in any one year; and they shall receive full salary for days of actual attendance upon filing with the secretary of the board a Certificate of Attendance, signed by the Executive Secretary of the Association."

Transportation

Will there be shuttle service to the convention center?

Yes. Shuttle service to and from the Atlantic City Convention Center will be available at Atlantic City High School, Borgata, Caesars, Golden Nugget, Hard Rock, Harrah's, Resorts and Tropicana.

Is it true that there's free parking at Atlantic City High School?

Yep! Free parking at Atlantic City High School and complimentary shuttle service to the Atlantic City Convention Center is available. The shuttle leaves every 15 minutes between 7 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. on Thursday and Friday. Remember to make allowances for Atlantic City traffic.

To reach the high school, take Exit 2 off the Atlantic City Expressway to Rt. 322/40 South. The high school will be on the right.

Is it true that you can take a train right into the Convention Center?

It sure is! NJ Transit provides rail service from Philadelphia to the Atlantic City Convention Center with stops in Pennsauken, Cherry Hill, Lindenwold, Atco, Hammonton, Egg Harbor City and Absecon. Purchase tickets using the NJ Transit Mobile App (*njtransit.com/app*) or from a ticket vending machine at any station. For Access Link accessibility information, call 973-491-4224.

Guests

May I bring immediate family members along?

Members may bring immediate family members onto the Exhibit Floor. Immediate family members are defined as spouse, civil union or domestic partner, parent, child or sibling. You may pick up guest badges on the second floor of the convention center. Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult at all times. Child care is available for children ages 3-14. See Page 25. No guests or children are permitted on the third and fourth floors of the convention center. Guests do not receive certificates of attendance.

Special-needs accommodations

How do I make arrangements for special-need accommodations?

Health and safety protocols

Do I have to wear a mask inside the convention center? What about other COVID protocols?

Masks will be optional at the 2022 NJEA Convention. Capacity in workshops and meeting rooms will be set at a level that accommodates social distancing. As of press time, proof of vaccination or the results of a recent PCR test are no longer required. NJEA will adhere to the safety protocols established by the New Jersey Department of Health, which may alter the above practices. 
