Connection to Standards

From our FAQs: "All of these curricular resources are within the goals and skills that the "Curriculum Engine" lists for Reading and Social Studies. All these lessons even fit into the Common Core State Standards. Reading teachers have long been told that the content is not as crucial as the skills being taught--so almost anything one can read (as long as it is not wildly age-inappropriate) is fair game. We have long used resources that the SDP does not list, put them in our lesson plans, taught the standards with them and have never had any trouble. We do not need to ask permission to implement a voluntary week of activities and lessons and offer educators choices about materials."

The critical reading, writing and discussion encouraged by these lessons fit firmly within the <u>Common Core Anchor Standards</u>, especially CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.CCRA.SL.1-3. These apply across grade levels K through 12, and can be seen represented especially in Reading and Writing Informational Text.
