






- 1. Several anti-LGBTQ+ and anti-trans bills were proposed.
- 2. State reps rushed to combine the worst parts of different bills into SB 150 and was passed within hours on March 15, 2023.
- 3. Governor Beshear vetoed SB 150 on March 24, 2023.
- 4. Kentucky's legislature overrode the governor's veto on March 29, 2023.
- 5. JCPS' School Board has until August 15, 2023 to comply with SB 150.

QUICK GUIDE: SB150

SB150 provisions:

- Allows school staff to misgender students.
- Restricts human sexuality and STI/STD education.
- Restrictions for gender-affirming medical care for trans youth.
- Medical professionals must detransition children already taking puberty blockers or undergoing hormone therapy.
- Schools would not be allowed to discuss sexual orientation or gender identity with students of any age.
- Required JCPS to craft a bathroom policy that, "at a minimum," won't allow trans kids to use the bathroom aligned with their gender identities.

THE WORK JCPS IS DOING

JCPS leadership, legal department, and members of the LGBTQ+ Advisory Committee to the Superintendent have been working diligently on SB150 and the effects of the bill this entire time.

Currently, there are two proposed versions of policies implementing SB150. The full JCBE reviewed and discussed these policies on Tuesday, July 25th at VanHoose. JCBE members voted on "Version 2" 3 to 3 tied (Marshall absent), tabled the vote, and passed a resolution. <u>CLICK HERE</u> to view this work.

1. Jack's Example:

■ Window: New Kid

Mirror/Window: The Pink Triangle: The Nazi War Against Homosexuals

- 2. Mirror: Think of a book that mirrors yourself and/or your experience where you're able to see yourself and your experience represented
- 3. Window: Think of a book that is a window into another world different from your own, yet you could connect, relate, and/or empathize
- 4. Think, reflect, and write about your mirror and window example
- 5. Share your "Mirror and Window" books with a partner
- **Posters, Lessons, Clubs, Staff, and More:** The Mirrors and Windows approach to culturally responsive schools should also include what's hanging on the walls of the school, the topics of lessons, clubs offered to students, and the staff walking the halls

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
The vast majority of LGBTQ+ students in Kentucky regularly (sometimes, often, or frequently) heard anti-LGBTQ+ remarks (Fig. 1). Many also regularly heard school staff make homophobic remarks (66%) and negative remarks about someone's gender expression (76%).

Most LGBTQ+ students in Kentucky experienced anti-LGBTQ+ victimization at school (Fig. 2). They also experienced victimization at school based on religion (44%), disability (40%), and race/ethnicity (16%). Most never reported the incident to school staff (61%), and of those who had, only 24% of LGBTQ+ students said that it resulted in effective staff intervention.





Figure 3. Anti-LGB I Q+ Discrimination in Kentucky Schools

Many LGBTQ+ students in Kentucky reported discriminatory policies or practices at their school (Fig. 3). Almost 3 in 4 (72%) experienced at least one form of anti-LGBTQ+ discrimination at school. Figure 3 shows the most common forms of anti-LGBTQ+ discrimination experienced by LGBTQ+ students in Kentucky.

(percentage of LGBTQ+ students harassed or assaulted in the past year based on...)
