Violence is unfortunately not uncommon, but it has been unavoidable in such a politically, culturally, and religiously complex area of the world. While we may hold different or congruent opinions about the years of war and conflict, I worry that the escalation this weekend will spark a rise in <u>Antisemitic (https://www.adl.org/what-we-do/fight-antisemitism)</u>and <u>Islamophobic (https://islamophobia.org/civil-rightsreports/2023-civil-rights-report-progress-in-the-shadow-of-prejudice/)</u> incidents in our own community. Our staff will be committed to safe and supportive learning environments and encourage anyone who is subject to or observes hate speech of any kind to report it to our staff members or administrators in the school district.
