Statement on Terrorist Attack in Israel

Dear BISD Community,

Our school district is committed to being a welcoming and inclusive community — one where staff, students, and families genuinely care for each other. An essential part of a caring community is shouldering grief when our members are hurting and comforting one another in times of sorrow.

While Israel is thousands of miles away from Bainbridge Island, the cruel and inhumane terrorist attack carried out this past weekend by Hamas has caused deep sadness and heartbreak over the lives lost in the attack on Israel. I recognize that there are students, families and staff members that

are suffering as a result of these recent events. As I observed the news today, it appears that the conflict is deepening and that there will likely be more death and trauma in the near future.

To our BISD families who are connected to loved ones in Israel, BISD is here for you and stands in solidarity with you. You are not grieving alone. If your student needs extra support or attention to process what is happening in Israel, please share your concerns with your student's teacher, counselor or principal. The more we know about how these events impact our students, the better we can partner with our families to provide support and care. I also want to remind families of the importance of monitoring what your students view online via social media and other websites. Many of the images being displayed can be trauma-inducing and not appropriate for children.

I encourage our community to contact neighbors, friends and loved ones impacted by this violence and let them know you care. I also ask you to be extra diligent in standing against any <u>antisemitism</u> or <u>Islamophobia</u> that may arise due to the recent events. You can report school-based concerns via <u>this portal</u>.

Finally, if you are looking for ways to support the Jewish community, there will be a candlelight vigil on Thursday, October 12th, at 5:30 p.m. at Waterfront Park on Bainbridge Island. **You are invited to attend with a peace-filled and caring heart.**



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
