Sex Assigned at Birth: The name-boy, girl or intersex-someone is given at birth based on what their genitals look like.

Intersex: The name given at birth to someone who may have a combination of genital body parts, or genitals that look like one sex, but inside, they have body parts of a different sex.

Gender: All the social stuff that goes with the sex you're assigned at birth; like how people are told they're supposed to dress or act.

Gender Identity: What a person knows their gender to be. This might or might not match what their genitals look like.

Gender Expression: The way a person shows their gender identity, typically through their appearance, dress, and behavior.

Cisgender: When someone's sex assigned at birth matches what they know their gender to be.

Transgender: When someone's sex assigned at birth is different from what they know their gender to be.

Gender Stereotyping: Making assumptions about someone's gender based on what they see on the outside; often used to limit people.

Unique: Being one of a kind; unlike anyone else.

Inclusion: Allowing everyone to be part of the group or providing equal access to opportunities and resources especially to those who are often excluded or marginalized.

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
