# What is Sexual Health?



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**Comprehensive Sexual health is a broad term that includes many topics:**

Sex Assigned at Birth, Gender, Gender Expression, Sexual Orientation, Anatomy, Reproductive Health, Self Image, Decision Making, Relationships, Respect, Bodily Autonomy & Consent, Values, Self Image, Sexual Behavior, Sexual Consent, Disease Prevention, Pregnancy Prevention, etc.

# Why Teach Sexual Health?

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Introduce early conversations

Introduce developmentally appropriate content

Build a foundation for later conversations

# Why Teach Sexual Health?



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## Sexual Health Lessons Are GOOD FOR ALL STUDENTS

Students develop basic life skills that starts with learning how to have respectful, kind and appropriate conversations with their peers with the goal for students to be able to:

- advocate for themselves and others
- knowing how and being able to have appropriate & responsible conversations with their peers
- understanding how their bodies work so if something isn't right they can communicate that to a parent/adult caregiver, trusted adult, doctor or nurse.
- setting clear expectations and boundaries in their relationships (including what consent means)
- Preventing harassment, bullying and sexual assault

# Why Do All Students Learn Together?

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Model open, shame-free and unbiased communication about sexual health topics.

Students acquire different perspectives.

All students receive unbiased equitable lessons.

# Parents/Guardians as Sexual Educators



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The role of parents is to love, nurture and support our children; the role of the schools is to educate our children.

Sexual Health Education is a joint effort.

# Sexual Health Lessons

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## Why Begin Sexual Health Lessons in Grade 4:

- Students are entering into puberty at an earlier age
- To build and maintain self-esteem and positive image through understanding human sexual development
- Provide accurate information and appropriate terms for students
- Encourage students to avoid slang terms
- Begin to evaluate body literacy that is age appropriate

# Gender Topics Presented



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**In APS we acknowledge that there are students whose gender does not align with their assigned sex at birth.**

**We acknowledge that in order for ALL students to feel included, our language as educators needs to be inclusive.**

# Gender Topics Presented



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## **What is Presented in Grade 4 and 5:**

An explanation of gender, sex assigned at birth and gender expression.

Demonstrate ways to treat people – including other students, their family members, and members of the school community – with dignity, respect, and empathy in regard to sex, gender identity and gender expression.

## **What is NOT Presented:**

Having students examine or question their own gender or someone else's.

# DESE Laws and Regulations Regarding Gender Inclusive Lessons



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## **Schools, through their curricula, shall encourage respect for the human and civil rights of all individuals, including LGBTQ individuals.**

The regulations addressing the Student Anti-discrimination Law state: *All public school systems shall, through their curricula, encourage respect for the human and civil rights of all individuals regardless of race, color, sex, gender identity, religion, national origin or sexual orientation.* See, 603 CMR 26.05(1).

Research shows that inclusion of LGBTQ topics in curricula corresponds to all students reporting that they feel safer in school, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity and expression. Curricula should reflect issues of sexual orientation and gender identity, as relevant, to be inclusive across subject areas, including, but not limited to, health, social science, language arts, and family life curricula.

# Grade Level Topics



## Grade 6 Topics Covered:

**Puberty Review, Reproductive Organs Review, Body Health Growth & Development, Brain Development, Bodily Autonomy & Consent (physical), Gender spectrum (including sexual orientation)**

## Grade 7 Topics Covered:

**Reproduction, Conception, Abstinence, Healthy/Unhealthy Relationships, Consent Laws (sex)**



# Grade Level Topics

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## Grade 8 Topics Covered:

**Abstinence, Pregnancy Prevention, Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Prevention, Healthy/Unhealthy Relationships, Consent Laws (sex), Child Pornography Laws, Identifying/Recognizing Harassment**

## Grade 9 Topics Covered:

**Pregnancy and STI Prevention Review, Consent & Child Pornography Laws Review, Sexual Health Decision Making Skills, Personal Values, Relationship Values.**

## Grade 4 Activity Example - Changes during puberty

### Making Sense of Social & Emotional Changes Optional Activity

- Divide students into groups. Assign one social or emotional change to each group.
- Ask students to come up with at least two suggestions for how kids going through puberty can manage these changes.
- Groups report out. Ask class for their reactions, and if they have anything to add.

## Grade 6 Activity Example - Consent

Students turn and talk about what consent means to them

Share outs and definitions (**Consent**: permission for something to happen or agreement to do something. **Bodily Autonomy**: the right for a person to govern what happens to their body without external influence or coercion.

True/False partner and group discussion reinforcing consent examples

# Skill Practice/Lesson Activity Examples



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## Grade 9 Activity Example - Communication/Consent

After a presentation lead by the teacher, students self reflect by thinking of a scenario that might call for a soft refusal and a harsh refusal. Optional share outs after the self reflection.

Students participate in a similar personal or small group discussion about what consent looks like, sounds like, and feels like. Optional share outs after.
